e come together in this "period of experimentation"

as we journey "towards becoming one unit of governance...." It is also a very significant time in our Church as it moves forward on the Synodal journey towards becoming a more collaborative and inclusive Church.

Our background is a world still emerging from a global pandemic, a world caught in the turmoil of widespread political and civil unrest, war and violence, a world increasingly affected by natural disasters, a world in which hunger is reaching catastrophic levels and a world, too, that is increasingly multicultural, interconnected and interdependent.

Our logo for this meeting expresses the theme of journeying from the past, represented by the green shoots that were sown at our 2019 General Chapter, when we set out on the journey of restructuring. The journey ahead looks steep, but we are not alone. The cloud of bright light represents the Holy Spirit who is enlightening us, urging us forward, *prompting* us to choose God's way. The Spirit, the Consoler, strengthens and unites our minds and hearts and brings them into harmony with the mind and heart of Christ (God's way), makes them available to what God wants.

The journey of restructuring continues to involve all of us, the whole Institute, young and old. We must not forget that its purpose is mission: that we may carry out our mission effectively today and in the future – that, as numbers decrease and structures become simpler and lighter, we may be light and salt, small but making a difference wherever we are. At



this stage in our journey of restructuring, we trust that God's Spirit is opening new horizons and inviting us - all of us – to new ways of living our life and mission in the 21^{st} century.

As we discern God's invitations to us today and how we can respond to them, we can be certain that we will be given the

resources that we need for mission. This was the belief of Father Gailhac when he wrote: "I shall pray only that you may have what is necessary to accomplish the works to which God will call you." We may no longer have large numbers of sisters, but we have the strength of our unity, the richness of our diversity of gifts, languages and cultures, the wealth and inspiration of our charism which we want to live today "with resilience" and in new ways. We continue to welcome new entrants in some of our areas and we are blessed with a growing spirit of collaboration within the Institute and with lay people, a gift which enables and empowers us to respond to today's urgent needs both locally and globally. And we have the advantage of today's communication technology to deepen unity and lighten the burden of administration. Can we recognize that this time of restructuring, which is requiring us to reduce our works and our properties in the face of declining numbers, is also offering us the grace of opting for the essentials in our choices for mission. Can we see that we are indeed blessed?

We will open the Year of Jean Gailhac during this meeting. May it be a year of abundant blessings for us and for all who are associated with us in mission. So let us ask with great trust, through the intercession of Father Gailhac, to have hearts and minds that are attentive to "the Holy Spirit's promptings" and let us ask with the same trust that in the year - and years - ahead we "may have what is necessary to accomplish the works to which God "will call [us]." Let us now "press ahead towards what awaits [us]."

The Faith-Vision of Père Jean Gailhac - Part I

This article is Part I of a compilation by Clevie Youngblood, RSHM, which she describes as "a synthesis of two writings by Sister Mary Milligan, RSHM, scholar and theologian, professor and dean, RSHM provincial and general superior. Mary did all the work of reading the writings of Père Gailhac and organizing them into an eloquent expression of his spirit-charism. My brief description of Père Gailhac's faith-vision is the result of her reflections and analysis." Part II will appear in the next issue of Highlights.

"God created me for Himself; He wants me to live only for His love and His glory. From my youth He has filled me with His holy fire. My heart has never wished to live without His love. That is not all. I have always felt in me the duty and the need to make Him loved. Quite young, He called me to the priesthood. I agreed to be a priest only on condition that I would live only to love Him and make Him loved. From my childhood, God has placed in me a great love for souls. That is the source of the works that He has urged me to undertake," 1

Here in the writings of Père Jean Gailhac we find the foundation of his faith-vision. It is a two-fold vision reflecting Jesus' teaching on the law: love God and love one's neighbor. "Total commitment to God and total gift of oneself to others are one reality for our founder."2

Gailhac's commitment to God is not only loving God personally but devoting himself to glorifying God by making God loved through the work of saving of souls. Love of God can only be accomplished through God, who became human in order to lead all to God. Loving God requires knowing God and it is the Triune God that Gailhac knows.


For Gailhac, God as Father is one "eternally covenanted" with humans as creator and guide, the source of holiness. All good flows from the Father, whether it is an individual talent, a person who accompanies us, or success in an



apostolate. "Let us give glory to God and let us think that if God does some good with such poor instruments, what good would He not do if we were saints!"3 All that God does is done with love because God is love. Love is God's life. Every act of God demonstrates love for humans, whether it is blessing, encouragement, compassion, forgiveness, or consolation. God's love is always faithful, never indifferent. It is a Father's infinite love, embracing each person. It is manifested in the Son, because it is Jesus who fully lives the life of the Father, a life of love.4

God the Son, Jesus Christ, is central to Gailhac's faith-vision. The Son was sent to reveal the Father and bring about the salvation of souls. Two titles Gailhac gives Jesus are Model and Savior. In His humanity, Jesus is the model for us. His words and actions reveal the Father. He attracts and enables us by his example. "I have given you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you" (Jn 13:15). Gailhac's challenge for us is to be true reflections of Jesus' life, to become other Christs.⁵

Jesus is a model for humans in his relationship to the Father. It is a relationship that is one with the Father in thoughts, words, and deeds. At all times, Jesus does the Father's will because He is one with the Father. "He was constantly concerned to do what the Father does (Jn 5:19), to give life as the Father does (Jn 5:21), to say what He had heard from the Father (Jn 8:26)."6 For Gailhac, Jesus is a model of obedience, who empties and humbles himself (Phil 2:7-8) in an expression of great love. His greatest act of humility was the Incarnation, being born in the image of humans, because Jesus shares the Father's own love for humankind. Jesus was also a model in His relationships with others. He embodies God's love for humans which motivates His self-emptying for the glory of God and salvation of souls.



Here, Jesus is the model of zeal – a zeal to make God known and loved. Gailhac uses the image of the Good Shepherd, who knows his sheep, works zealously and compassionately to bring them back to the fold, and rejoices in their salvation. With Jesus as model, Gailhac encourages these traits of obedience, humility, compassion, and zeal as ways to come to know God.⁷

Gailhac's focus on Jesus as Savior is another significant aspect of his faith-vision. Jesus undertakes the work of salvation of humankind through His life, but it is His passion, death, and resurrection that accomplish it. Through the cross Jesus empties himself, sacrifices himself, expresses the greatest form of love by giving his life for us. By the cross, Jesus restores life, reconciling us to God. By the resurrection, Jesus invites us into this new life. Gailhac uses this imagery of death and life to show how we enter into new life: by stripping ourselves of faults, by dying to ourselves, so as to embrace and live God's own life. Renunciation becomes the key to spiritual resurrection. Salvation is achieved by living a life in imitation of Christ.⁸

Within Gailhac's Christocentric faith-vision, the Holy Spirit plays a significant role. The founder sees the Spirit as the two-fold love of the Father and the Son, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. It is this Love-Spirit who enables the continuation of Jesus' life and mission by transforming humans into other Christs. Transformation occurs only when we are open to being led by the Spirit as Jesus was. Such

docility to the Spirit requires openness to the workings of the Spirit in our hearts and souls. It requires sacrifice because we become rooted in love by "dying to oneself." It is through the presence of the Holy Spirit within us that we are introduced into the love between the Father and the Son and are enabled to live in that love.⁹

To fully participate in the life of God we must be turned toward God ("Soyez a Dieu"). For Gailhac this means allowing oneself to belong to God, to be possessed by God ("etre a Dieu"). God is to be the motivation of all one's actions and the criterion of all one's choices. Being turned toward God requires a personal conversion, changing one's orientation from oneself to God. It is a dynamic process demanding continual renunciation, a deep desiring for God.¹⁰ It cannot be just a desire. It must be enacted through one's life. In a letter to the sisters, Gailhac writes: "My dear daughters, be turned toward God, love Him with all your heart, may He be all for you; be all for Him. With love, nothing is painful, nothing is costly.... The heart which loves uses everything in order to love more."11 The one who models this for us is Jesus, whose life and being were fully turned toward God.

YEAR OF GAILHAC SOLIDARITY GESTURES

The Global Network of RSHM Schools Celebrates The Year of Gailhac Through Community Service and Learning

Marymount Schools in London, Paris, and Rome developed a content-driven and interactive online seminar class for grade 6 and 7 students. The students explore new content critically and creatively in collaboration with their peers in London, Paris, and Rome. Students delve into topics/themes that engage them in solving a world problem relating to the core values and aligned to the vision of our Founders, "that all may have life." Currently, the students study U.N. Climate Goal #14 - Water - as a social justice issue in solidarity with the most vulnerable. Students learn about access to clean water, water as a cause of war and peace, and ways to make access to water a reality for vulnerable communities. The culminating service event, a Walk for Water, will demonstrate the commitment of our global community. Donations gathered in support of this initiative will be offered to our sister community in Zimbabwe.

At Istituto Marymount Rome,

a student-faculty FUN RUN for Mozambique is held in March and April. Open to all students, those signing up either run or walk 50km or 100km over a 30-day period. They are sponsored by friends and family to complete the run. The school organizes weekly running/walking groups to help students achieve their goals together and enjoy the community spirit. The FUN RUN money raised will go to the hostel run by the RSHM sisters in Mozambique where girls stay during the school year in order to pursue their education.



In this anniversary year, the school is planning to set up a Padre Gailhac Student Grant fund. This fund would award a grant to a student in need to further his or her education. One example might be a grant to a student in another RHSM school (e.g., Brazil) which would allow him or her to travel on a cultural exchange to our school.

Colegios Marymount, Cuernavaca, Barranquilla, Medellin, and Bogata have created an area project: Recognizing Women's Dignity through Father Gailhac's Eyes in Today's Society. The project's objective is to "promote Gailhac's vision and respect for women through a social media campaign developed by our own students." Activities include reflecting and brainstorming on translating Gailhac's message into concrete examples, developing content and messages to be shared on the schools' social media networks, and visiting a vulnerable community to share Father Gailhac's message and conduct an activity with young people.





The community at Marymount High School, Los Angeles will work with a local nonprofit organization, A Place Called Home (APCH), which was born out of the desire to provide a safe place for children and families afflicted by gang violence. The organization's goal of supporting its members through programs in arts, education, and wellness for the young people in South Central Los Angeles is a natural fit with the RSHM mission. All students, faculty, and staff will participate at some point during the project. Alumnae and parents will also have the opportunity to join service activities. The 11th grade will participate through weekly activities including tutoring and sports practices.

Colegio de Nossa Senhora do Rosario, **Porto** expresses its solidarity gesture through its campaign, Caring with the Heart Involves Action. They will collect food for the families the school helps within the scope of the "Roots Project" (daily support for underprivileged children from the surrounding neighborhoods) and PAS (Project of Social Monitoring of the Homeless of the City).
